

SLOANE CROSLEY

Sloane Crosley is a fiercely funny author and essayist whose humor is lively and genuine. She is a relentless comedic force who the *New York Times* called, "an incisive observer of human nature."

Sloane Crosley is the author of *The New York Times* bestselling essay collections, *I Was Told There'd Be Cake* (a 2009 finalist for The Thurber Prize for American Humor) and *How Did You Get This Number*, as well as *Look Alive Out There* (a 2019 finalist for The Thurber Prize for American Humor) and the bestselling novels, *The Clasp* and *Cult Classic. I Was Told There'd Be Cake* was described as "perfectly, relentlessly funny" by David Sedaris. Her latest work, an essay collection titled *Grief Is For People* was published in 2024. Of the collection, John Mulaney writes, "[It] captures the feeling of watching a beloved, inappropriate and wild person fit less and less with the times we live in. Like Didion's *The Year of Magical Thinking* or Defoe's *Journal of A Plague Year*, *Grief Is for People* takes us through the ordinary, awful and never-quite-ending experience of loss. It also made me laugh very hard, many times. I can't stop thinking about it."

In 2011, Sloane co-created <u>sadstuffonthestreet.com</u>, a blog dedicated to sad/funny curbside detritus. In 2017, she co-wrote a book inspired by the blog called *The Sad Stuff on The Street*, and 100% of the proceeds from the book go to NAMI, the National Alliance on Mental Illness. Sloane was the inaugural columnist for the *New York Times* Op-Ed "Townies" series and is featured in The Library of America's *50 Funniest American Writers*. She is a contributing editor at *Vanity Fair*, a contributing editor at *Interview Magazine*, and a columnist for *The Village Voice*, *Vanity Fair*, *The Independent*, *Black Book*, *Departures* and *The New York Observer*.
